# Hudson to keynote banquet

Gary Hudson, a highly successful bank executive, will be the keynote speaker for the 63rd annual Founders Day Banquet of Iota Theta Zeta. The event will be held on April 22 at the Cooper Alumni Center on the Arkansas State University campus.

A 1975 graduate of ASU, he was initiated as zeta number 377 in the spring of 1972. He was president of his pledge class and later served the chapter as High Beta (vice president).

After receiving his political science degree here, Brother Gary earned a law degree from the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville School of Law. He then returned to his hometown DeWitt and practiced law for 18 months.

However, he entered the banking field in December 1980 as vice president and trust officer of Farmers and Merchants Bank of Stuttgart. He returned to DeWitt in January 1988 as president and chief executive officer of DeWitt Bank and Trust Company and later became chairman of the board until he resigned at the end of 2001

He started a branch of Farmers and Merchants Bank in DeWitt in 2002 and stayed there through 2009 as the branch grew quickly, then returned to Stuttgart in January 2010 as president and CEO. The bank grew from about \$600 million in assets in 2010 to more than \$1.6 billion in assets by the time he retired at the end of 2020.

Farmers & Merchants now has branches in 17 Arkansas towns, including Jonesboro. He continues to serve as vice chairman of the bank's Board of Directors.

He has served as president of the

DeWitt and Stuttgart Rotary Clubs, president of the DeWitt Chamber of Commerce, chairman of the board (for 10 years) of the First United Methodist Church of DeWitt, a member and chairman of the Board of Visitors of Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, and a member and chairman of the Board of Directors of the Arkansas State Bank Department.

For four years he was one of two Arkansas members of a community banking board with The Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis and is the dean of bankers for the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking Foundation Board of Trustees at SMU in Dallas.

His wife is the former Connie Mayall of Stuttgart, a retired teacher and math coach from the DeWitt public schools. She was a Phi Mu while at ASU in the mid 1970s. They have two children — Cara Coleman, lead counselor for Mountain Home High School, and Patrick Hudson,

## From the High Alpha of Iota Theta Zeta

This year has, as all years do, has had many ups and downs for Iota Theta. Despite the battles that have been fought, the chapter has arguably been the most successful on campus in every function of a fraternity. National officers emphasized during our time on social probation the need for balance between philanthropy, brotherhood, social events, education and campus involvement. That balance has defined our chapter.

We started off with our Red White and Blue Barbecue at the end of the summer, hosting a volleyball tournament with other Greek organizations as well as a barbecue competition. We raised \$4,000 for Retrieving Freedom, an organization that provides service animals to veterans and kids with disabilities. The cherry on top was our A-team winning the men's bracket of the tournament.

The next thing the chapter tackled was fall rush, and as always, we showed out. This year only 90 guys went through Interfraternity Council recruitment. Despite the general numbers being significantly lower than they have been in recent years, we still pulled a class of 25 young men, five more than the next largest class.

While numbers do not immediately speak to the character of these new members, it does speak to the appeal of our brotherhood and how many guys want to be a part of it. Nineteen of these 25 were initiated in January, and two are going back through the process this spring along with five new spring associates. The brotherhood is going strong and continuing to build up new men to carry on its legacy.

In October the Fall 2021 Associate Class competed in the Best Men on Campus contest, the most soughtafter title by fraternities at Arkan-

sas State. The competition pits new member classes up against each other in seven different categories. Fall '21 showed out and won five of those seven categories: academics (highest GPA), service hours, involvement and leadership, the halftime show performance, and the basketball tournament (in which the whole chapter could participate). They were so far ahead of the competition that they had secured the Overall Best Men on Campus Award before the basketball tournament or halftime show even started.

As it is every year, our biggest philanthropy event in the fall was Cream of the Crop. With COVID regulations lightened since last year, we were able to raise more than 30,000 meals for Feeding America. We were Feeding America's top organization for the fifth time in the last six years, and it was arguably the largest and most successful single-day philanthropy event on campus this year.

We also held a rally at the house with Red Wolves for St. Jude, during which our members raised \$2,000 for

the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Between the barbecue, Cream of the Crop and the rally, Iota Theta raised more than \$8,000 and 35,000 pounds of food in the fall, and we still have upcoming philanthropy events this spring.

After a year of Zoom classes and online exams, returning to in-person classes affected a lot of grade point averages on campus. Online classes were much easier to pass, and the return to the classroom caused GPAs to decline across the board. The average GPA for Greek men in the fall was a 2.45, which is 0.25 below the requirement to be a member fraternity in the IFC. Despite this trend, Lambda Chi Alpha stood out. Even with the largest roster on campus, our fall GPA stood at a 3.05, and our overall GPA stands at a 3.27, making us one of two chapters to actually increase our GPA since fall '20. Academically, this puts us right at the top of the IFC fraternities by a large margin.

Our involvement on campus continues to grow as well. Our members hold a diverse set of leadership positions across campus. Tyler Hickman is currently the IFC president and the chairman of the Arkansas State Leadership Council. He has also been a Chancellor's Ambassador, SGA senator, and Pack Leader this year.

A few other campus organizations we hold positions in include the Red Wolves for St. Jude Executive Board, the IFC Executive Board, the Student Philanthropy Council, the Chancellor's Leadership Class, the Sales Club and several other smaller organizations. There is not a single fraternity that even comes close to the level of influence we have on campus.

Iota Theta continues to set the standard across the board, even in areas where most fraternities are declining or becoming stagnant. In a national

# From the House Corp. Board president

It has been a busy year for the LXA at ASU Inc. House Board. Since the retirement of our mortgage at the end of 2020, several maintenance projects/updates have been completed.

These include:

- Rebuilding of the deck off the game room that overlooks the volleyball court, thanks to a donation of materials by board member Justin Miles.
- A new food disposal installed in kitchen as well as cabinets repaired with new knobs/handles on all drawers and doors
- All residential rooms equipped with new doorknobs and deadbolt locks along with some needed repairs for door frames.
- Multiple interior doors in residences repaired/replaced.
- Rotten floor joists under the game room floor replaced as well as game room carpet which was replaced with laminate flooring that has the look of wood.
- Walls of the small deck off the Alumni Room replaced after termite damage was detected.
- Three motorized shades were installed to cover the windows in the big meeting room and corded shades

were added to both the Alumni Room and portico to block sunlight as needed.

One of our priorities was renovating all 12 residential rooms, which have deteriorated with use and without much attention over the years.

Rooms 1 and 2 were renovated, along with the bathroom in between them. This included painting of all walls in room 1, ceilings in all rooms; filling various holes in the walls, including one large hole that required new sheetrock; replacing the floor in room 1 (mold was found under the old one); installing new ceiling fans/lights and doing some other minor electrical work; repairing sink drains; and repainting interior doors.

Rooms 5 and 6 were also renovated, along with the bathroom in between them. This included filling in various holes in the walls, including one large one that required new sheetrock; tearing out the existing flooring in both rooms and replacing it with waterproof laminate; painting all the walls; replacing both overhead light fixtures and other minor electrical work; repairing a leak in the bathroom ceiling, caused by a faulty toilet seal in the bathroom above, then repairing and painting the ceiling; repairing door

frames; replacing missing or rusty wall and ceiling vents; repairing sink drains.

We had hoped to get six rooms completed last summer, but time and money ran short. We will try to get an earlier start this coming summer and renovate the remaining eight.

Cost of labor and materials for renovating these four rooms was approximately \$5,000 per room. In total, the projects listed above cost us approximately \$42,000.

To keep the cost of room rentals competitive with other fraternities on campus, we use alumni contributions to help pay for long-term improvements while trying to maintain a Reserve Fund for emergencies. With support from alumni through annual dues payments of \$50 or by joining our Founders Circle for any amount of \$125 and up, you can help us maintain a Reserve Fund for repairs and maintenance.

If you have been a regular contributor, we thank you. If you haven't had the opportunity to donate, it's never too late!
