'High Five' campaign hits first goal

The "High Five for Lambda Chi" capital campaign is a success.

As of Oct. 20, LXA at ASU Inc., your alumni organization and house corporation, has received \$186,109 in contributions and pledges. The actual amount of cash received to date is \$54,099, as many of the 91 brothers participating are making their contributions over a 5-year period.

The pledges and contributions have ranged from \$20 to \$50,000.

The Board of Directors set a minimum goal of raising \$150,000 to fund a project of repairs and renovations to the fraternity house, which was opened in 1986. Estimates indicated that would be necessary to make the house worthy of our chapter again, or as some of us have said, "to make it livable."

Over the years the house has deteriorated due to a combination of normal wear-and-tear, some neglect and financial difficulties that prevented routine maintenance. A storm in 1998

There is no charge for alumni who have paid 2011 dues and-or contributed to the capital campaign. For others a donation of \$10 per person will be asked.

The Homecoming game itself, against the University of North Texas, will begin at 6 p.m.

As part of the tailgate package, LXA at ASU has 25 general admission tickets to the game that will be given away, first-come, first-served, two per zeta number. Reserved seats may be purchased at the box office. See Brother David Merrell, Iota Theta 719, at the house or tailgate or contact him early by e-mail, dmerrell67@gmail.com.

Many other activities have been scheduled for the weekend by the university, the ASU Alumni Association and other organizations.

One of them will feature an alumnus of Iota Theta. The College of Communications will host the official opening of its RTV-HD studio at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, to be followed at 10 a.m. by the annual Communications Seminar. The speaker will be Mike Meroney, Iota Theta 814. Brother Mike graduated in 1996 and is owner of Meroney Public Affairs in Austin, Texas.

The ASU Alumni Association will sponsor a pre-game tailgate party at the Cooper Alumni Center, 2600

caused major damage to the house, but our insurance coverage paid for repairs.

Since the chapter emerged from probation in late 2005 and squared itself financially with the national organization, Iota Theta and the house corporation have steadily improved their financial situation. This was done largely by stressing financial responsibility of the actives as individuals and as a group. The chapter has not missed a payment to the house corporation in the last five years and has not been late in the last two.

Along with setting a minimum goal of \$150,000, the Board of Directors planned the renovation project in two phases. The first, to cost about \$100,000, will begin any day and will be done by Construction Network Inc. of Jonesboro. This phase will include securing the house by installing new doors and a security system and replacing residential bathroom facilities.

To pay for the first phase without draining the Reserve Fund, the board is taking a short-term loan of \$70,000.

Last year we put in a completely new heating and air conditioning system, paying for it with the Reserve Fund and a short-term loan. The latter was paid off this summer.

The second phase of our renovation project will be done next summer, and the board will take a new look at what needs to be done and what we can afford to do prior to proceeding. During the planning of the first phase, we discovered that it would cost \$12,000 to \$15,000 to get fiber optic cable run to the house so we can take full advantage of ASU's network capabilities.

We emphasize that this project will not make the house "like new again." There are many more things we'd like to do to make the house more comfortable and attractive, that we should do to keep Iota Theta competitive among the fraternities on campus. Therefore, we are continuing the capital campaign through at least the end of the year, and we urge all brothers who haven't already participated to add their names to the honor roll of supporting alumni.

You can do that simply by completing the form on page 7 and mailing it back with your check.

We still owe about \$250,000 on the house mortgage. The original loan was later combined with a second-

ary loan to pave the parking lot, and for a time we didn't make much progress on paying off the principal. But during the past five years we've been able to pay it down by almost \$100,000, and we embarked on this capital campaign in hopes of avoiding an addition to our long-term debt.

Anything raised in excess of our renovation needs will be held in the Reserve Fund for major maintenance or applied to mortgage reduction. For an operation our size, we should have a Reserve Fund of at least \$20,000. Twice during the past five years we've run into breakdowns that cost more than \$10,000 to fix.

Alumni making contributions can also specify mortgage reduction.

All contributions to the High Five for Lambda Chi campaign will be recognized on a plaque in the foyer of the house. We will have to set a cutoff date early next year to get plaque ready for Founders Day 2012 so get your name on the list now.

We should surely have more than 150 brothers contributing to this cause.


