Ridenour to speak at banquet

Alumni, active brothers and associates will gather Friday, April 21, to celebrate the 63rd anniversary of the founding of Lambda Chi Alpha at then-Arkansas State College.

Among those taking part will be alumni with zeta numbers in the low hundreds and actives whose numbers are above 1,600.

The weekend's activities will start Friday with a banquet in the Cooper Alumni Center on the ASU campus. The lobby will be open for brotherhood starting at 5:30 p.m., and the dinner buffet will open at 6:30.

Danny Ridenour, Iota Theta Zeta No. 591, will be the keynote speaker. He is a longtime radio executive and personality.

Chapter and alumni awards will be presented during the banquet, which will honor the members of the Veterans Club who formed first a colony and then Iota Theta Zeta in 1959. Of the 76 original members, 40 are known to be deceased.

Of the 36 men initiated as part of the first two pledge classes, 21 are believed to be still alive. Many of them, unlike the Veterans Club members who had returned to college after the Korean War, were traditional college students.

The cost for banquet tickets is \$25 for active members and their guests; \$40 for alumni and their guests.

The annual meeting of the zeta's alumni association, LXA at ASU Alumni Inc., will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 22, in the Alumni Room at the fraternity house. It will be followed by an informal luncheon at the house.

A financial report for the alumni association and also the house corporation will be given. Three members of the association board will be elected to 3-year terms. Incumbent members Pete Murphy, Barry Forrest and Roy Ockert have expressed a willingness to stand for re-election.

The Founders Circle Golf Scramble will start at 12:30 p.m. Saturday at the Sage Meadows Country Club. Competition will be in 2-man actives teams and 2-man alumni teams. Where possible, one active team and one alumni team will be paired in a foursome, and trophies will also be given for the low combined foursome score.

Entry fee is \$45 for actives and \$60 for alumni.

Unlike in the recent years, Iota Theta has experienced a prosperous year with only a few minor hiccups along the way. Despite these obstacles our chapter has excelled in every aspect that exists within a fraternity.

Due to the success we have experienced in academics, philanthropy, campus involvement and even social events, we have been able to reinforce the bond that holds us all together — brotherhood. These victories, of course, are unachievable without the hard work and dedication from the active chapter throughout this year. That being said, I attribute this year's attainments to the resounding commitment of our brothers, active or alumni.

To start off the fall 2022 semester, we hosted our annual Red White and Blue Barbecue. The event consisted of a volleyball tournament with participating teams from other fraternities and sororities. Along with that, several members volunteered to cook and serve barbecue to those in attendance. In total, we raised \$3,000 for Retrieving Freedom, an organization that provides service animals to veterans and children with disabilities. To top it all off, our A-team placed first in the men's bracket of the volleyball tournament.

Soon after that, fall rush kicked into full gear. Per usual, our chapter blew others out of the water. Come bid day, 26 new members were welcomed into the fraternity as associates. This 26-man associate class was seven more than the next largest pledge class.

Later that month A-State's campus recreation began its intramural flag-football leagues. A league was open to all students, and of course, a league for Greek organizations.

We put together two teams for this league — our A-team and the "Bteam Bombers." Throughout the season both teams were successful enough to eventually face off in the Greek League championship. Although it was a great game, the A-team prevailed. Because both teams made it to the championship, both A- and B-teams qualified for the playoffs against the qualifying teams from the Non-Greek League. In the championship round our A-team came out on top as the campuswide champion after defeating the opponent 22-13.

Even though the bragging rights and championship rings are notable, there are several other things to celebrate from this past year — one of those being our academic success. As a chapter we finished second among Inter-Fraternity Council chapters with a 3.07 grade average for the fall 2022 semester. The average GPA for all of IFC was a 2.82.

The fall semester brought Iota Theta's cumulative average to 3.26.

Something else worth recognizing is our biggest philanthropy event in the fall — Cream of the Crop. The Food Bank of Northeast Arkansas was at risk of shutting down due to a decline in the total amount of food being donated. However, we were able to raise 22,000 pounds of food and nearly \$1,500 for the cause. This substantial influx was enough to keep the Food Bank's doors open, and thousands of families fed.

Our campus involvement is another aspect we continue to prioritize. For example, two of our members are executive officers for IFC. Landon Valdez is the IFC president, and Clay Aureli oversees IFC recruitment.

The last aspect of our chapter that has made positive strides this year is our social events. In mid-September we hosted "Lambdapalooza," which was the first registered event for the majority of our membership. After the event we received positive feedback from the school as well as the sororities regarding how well run and fun the event was. It was great to see how successful an event we could host, especially after a long hiatus due to COVID-19 and previous probationary terms.

With all the momentum in favor of us, the chapter is looking forward to finishing out the year strong. Our upcoming events include a semi-formal in Memphis, our biggest philanthropy in the Spring, Sandblast, as well as "Lambda Luau," a registered event to compliment Sandblast. So long as the chapter's mindset remains focused on positive growth, there is no doubt in my mind that we can continue to do bigger and better things.

From the House Corp. Board president

When you own a fraternity house, something always needs to be repaired or replaced. Over the past two summers we have remodeled all 12 residential rooms. Having remodeled four in 2021, the house board set out to finish the remaining eight over this past summer. This was the first renovation of the residence area of the house since 2011-12.

Our summer 2022 work on the eight residential rooms involved correcting flaws and holes in the walls, then repainting them, repainting the ceilings, putting new floors in all but one of the rooms, replacing or repainting doors as needed, replacing outlet covers, installing new lights as needed, repairing cabinets and bathroom fixtures, painting and reinstalling baseboards.

Our assistant house manager, Cameron Tefteller, stayed through the summer and did much of the wall repair and painting, which saved the House Corp. a great deal of money.

Prior to the 2022 project, the board decided to limit the six upper rooms

to one resident per room. Our theory was that the rooms are too small for two men per room, especially with full-sized bunk beds, and four guys sharing one bathroom was also too much. The result was that the rooms were taking excessive wear and tear, and because of the crowding, we had difficulty making repairs when needed.

The downstairs rooms would remain occupied by two men per room, four per bathroom.

In addition to the work on the rooms, we replaced all hallway light fixtures in the second-floor residential hallway. In the fall we did the same with the first-floor residential hallway and the kitchen.

We also had new landscape lighting installed in front of the house to illuminate the rock LXA sign. We had a dusk-till-dawn timer installed to turn those lights, as well as others in front of the house, on and off. We replaced some damaged guttering in front of the house and added downspouts to direct rainwater away from the house.

Altogether the House Corp. spent more than \$75,000 on maintenance

in 2021 and 2022. Most of the work was desperately needed, and some had been postponed for years due to the lack of available funding.

As a board, we take very seriously the duty to spend wisely. As all of you are aware, the cost of operating a residence has increased dramatically in the last year. Our gas and electric bills have gone from \$1,000 per month to more than \$1,650 per month. And more notably, our insurance premium was to increase 50 percent from \$12,000 per year to more than \$19,000. Through some negotiation Roy did get it down to about \$15,000 for this year, but it will continue to increase annually.

We continue to need alumni support. Please consider helping us by becoming a member of Founders Circle or at the very least, paying \$50 annual alumni dues. We are grateful for you.
